This week, we explored pumpkins.

Aunty Rae gifted us some pumpkins from her garden to cook with. In addition, we had bought pumpkins last week form the farmer's market. Ms

Elizabeth brought in two large orange




p to carve. All of our pumpkins looked different on the outside. Their skins were different colors and some were more bumpy than others. We took this opportunity to talk about similarities and differences. We compared the color of our skin with eachother and noticed that we were all different shades. We aske d the children to guess what the inside would look like. When we cut them open, we discovered that, although they looked very different on the outside, the pumpkins were very similar on the inside. We then read a book by Mem Fox called "Whoever You Are." She also talks about similarities and differences in the fabric of humanity.

Paired Pumpkin Painting~The children were each given half a pumpkin and tasked with finding their partner who had the other half. The children taped their pumpkins together and then painted them in a box with a large golf ball. The children had to work together to mix yellow and red paint by rolling the



ball back and forth. This took team work, communication and cooperation. Paired activities help build these skills as well as flexibility!



#### Pumpkin Soup-The Best You Ever Tasted!

The children enjoyed reading the book "Pumpkin Soup" about some quarrelsome animals that make soup together. We discussed the different feelings those animals were experiencing and the different solutions they may have come up with. We then made our own pumpkin soup. The children were invited to help with the peeling and chopping. When cooking, the children are given real tools to use. We differentiate between tools and toys. Tools have a specific purpose and should only be used for that purpose whereas toys are open ended. The children follow rules with only two children cutting or peeling a t a time with a teacher in the middle. Allowing children to use real tools gives them a sense of empowerment. Showing that we trust them

builds our relationships. After we added all the ingredients, the children got a turn to mix it with the hand blender and then we all tasted it for afternoon snack. It was delicious!

### **Mask-making**

On Friday, we decorated masks in preparation for Halloween. We talked about how grown ups also dress up on Halloween and that can be scary but that it is just people pretending. At group time, Ms Gemma put on a scary pumpkin mask but talked in her regular voice to let

everyone know it was still her! The children decorated their masks with various materials. We quickly realized that markers did not work on the shiny surface when alll of our friends had colorful faces! Some children chose to add black glitter and others were very particular about where to put their feathers. The Nene group enjoyed wearing their masks outside while Ms Elizabeth chassed them around the playground.



### **Police Officer Visit**

Caleb's Mommy asked her friend, Officer Brown to visit our class this week. She told us all about ways to stay safe, especially around Halloween. The Pueo group had brainstormed a list of questions for her and she was able to cover all of them. She shared tips such as bring a flashlight and wear reflective clothing.
